Reporting Volunteer Hours

The method for reporting volunteer hours has changed. We are now using the Purdue on-line system. You must register to use the system. Register for Purdue MG Manager here: www.purdue.edu/mg-volunteer. There is a video on how to register at: http://tinyurl.com/ze9jaz3. You will need to obtain the county code first from the extension office.

Once you have registered, the system is very straight forward. You should enter all volunteer and educational activity from last November forward. The system will also accept entries (that you have not submitted previously) for older unreported activity that you want to catch up with.

The old reporting form has been deleted from the website. Reports on the old paper from won't be accepted by the extension office.

From Our ANR

A reminder to active Master Gardeners that we have now transitioned to the new Purdue MG Manager online system. That means Master Gardeners will now be entering ALL of their volunteer and education hours. Many of you have already registered and are entering hours. We have more than half of our active MG's doing this already, so thank you! I am hearing positive feedback already from those we registered. Once you are in the system it is very user friendly and easy to use. However, we still have members who have not registered. This is something all MG's must do in order to report hours and stay active- receive a minimum of 12 volunteer hours and 6 education hours per year. If you have not registered, please do so today at: https://www.purdue.edu/mg-volunteer.

If you have any questions, please call Janet Cunningham in the Extension office. Janet is quickly becoming our in-house expert on the new database. She has spent countless hours trying to learn the new system and offering suggestions to the State Office to make it better. Thank you to Janet! If you don't have access to a computer, we have guest computers in the Extension Office that you can use to register and enter your hours. Please make an appointment with Janet, Monday – Friday, 8 am – 4 pm, if you would like to use a guest computer. Our goal is to have all our MG's registered and entering hours so we are happy to help.

See our Monday, February 27th email with further instructions. Lastly, I have heard some questions about what counts and doesn't count for education hours. If you attend a seminar, presentation, lecture, or program that is gardening or home horticulture related, you can earn education hours for the time you attended the program. The program does not have to be through Purdue University or through the Association. For example: if you attend a library program on vegetable gardening from 11 am – 12 pm that was presented by a local library, you can earn 1 hour of education time. Your travel to and from the event DOES NOT count for education hours. Another example: the local greenhouse is offering an educational seminar on indoor plants and you attend 30 minutes of the program. You can earn 0.5 education hours. However, if you attend a flower show or exhibit, your time walking around the event and visiting booths and vendors does not count. For example: You attend the Indy Flower and Patio show for 3 hours walking the show, visiting vendors asking the vendors their advice on the best way to grow their plants or use their gardening products. This DOES NOT count as education hours. However, if you attend a garden show and attend an educational presentation at the show, the time you spent attending that presentation counts. For example: You attend Gardening For All Ages and visit over 50 booths talking to many of the vendors. You also attend the presentation on carnivorous plants at 1:30 pm – 2:15 pm. You DON'T earn hours for the time visiting vendors, however you CAN earn education hours for the time spent attending the session on carnivorous plants. So you would earn 0.75 hours of education.

I recommend that you check with me if you are in doubt on what counts and doesn't count for volunteer or education hours before you attend an event or volunteer. Just send me an email if you have any questions and I am happy to work with you to determine if it counts or doesn't count for MG hours.
