### Thursday Tour Updates-

John Chapin and his wife Kathy built their home in 1983 on four acres of scrub and weeds. There were just a few trees of any size, including two huge white ashes and a silver maple,



as well as a grove of very small sugar maples, so they planted hundreds of white pines, river birches, and bald cypresses. The arrival of the Emerald Ash Borer necessitated the removal of the two huge ashes and about two dozen other smaller ashes and wild cherry trees, resulting in a

sudden change from full shade to full sun in a large part of the gardens. Dozens of shade perennials were transplanted to new areas and the new full-sun area has been replanted with magnolias, lilacs, redbuds, dwarf and/or unusual conifers, and perennials. John's garden is not only featured on Country Garden Tour #1 but will also be on the Plainfield Garden Tour

for 2018. John will also be one of our vendors at the State Conference.

The Stephens family home is set on eight acres of secluded woods and is the first stop on Country Garden Tour #2. Beginning in 1976 with



the building of the gazebo overlooking a new pond and bridge, Bill Stephens continued to add to their wonderland with a second pond. There are many magnificent gardens, including a formal garden, rose garden and a variety of gardens with hostas, daylilies and irises. Bill is also a trial gardener for new irises and daylilies and was featured on the Iris tour in 2017.
