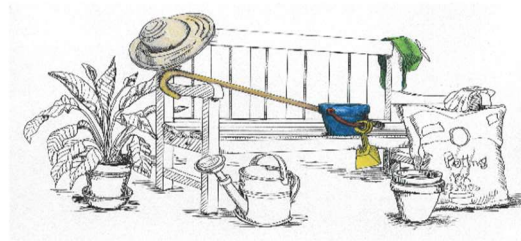

Adventures in Gardening Registration Open



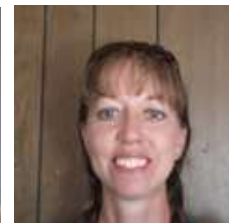

Eloisa Garza, chair of our Plainfield Correctional facility project has some much welcome good news to share. "We are happy to report that the men have been gardening," she says. "Despite the Coronavirus creating difficult conditions for both

the men and staff members, they have still been able to garden. In addition, they also made face masks for their own use and shipped them to other facilities. I was able to collect donations of 140 pounds of fabric plus thread, elastic and even a sewing machine!"

Over the summer, the men at Plainfield donated some starters plants to our HCMG demonstration garden as promised.

So far this year, the project has also donated 10 pounds of radishes to Sheltering Wings Women's' Center, and 90 pounds of radishes, beets and lettuce to Wheeler Mission.

HCMG extends a huge thank you to all who have supported and volunteered for this hugely successful effort.
